Spring training is officially underway and you all know what that means! That's right - baseball is back! 2014 was a great year for baseball, starting with the additions of rookies Masahiro Tanaka, Jose Abreu, Jacob Degrom, and Javier Baez. The season continued with Jordan Zimmerman's no hitter, Albert Pujols' 500th career home run, and Derek Jeter's walk-off hit in his final game at Yankee Stadium. The Kansas City Royals had a Cinderella story throughout the postseason, but the shoe didn't fully fit and the San Francisco Giants won the World Series in the do-or-die Game Seven. This fantastic season of baseball came to a close in February during the awards ceremony. Clayton Kershaw and Mike Trout each won a well-deserved MVP Award, while Cory Kluber surprised everyone with his Cy Young Award. The question is, who will win these awards this year? Here are my predictions:

NL MVP: Last year's NL MVP, Clayton Kershaw, can't be counted out as a finalist for NL MVP. However, in the past 20 years, only two pitchers have won the award, so it will more likely go to a position player this year. You can't rule out the Washington Nationals' infielder Anthony Rendon, who won the Silver Slugger award last year and is set for a breakout year. But even with Kershaw and Rendon, my vote has to go with the All-Star outfielder, Giancarlo Stanton. With his second place finish

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for the MVP last year, complemented by 37 home runs and 105 RBIs, Stanton is my favorite to take home this award.

AL MVP: Mike Trout won the award last vear without competition. Trout led the league in runs and RBIs last year and finished third in home runs with 36. He finished in the top two in each of his first three seasons in the MLB, and 2015 should be no different.

NL Cy Young: All indications seem to show that the Dodgers' ace, Clayton Kershaw, will take home his third consecutive Cy Young Award. Kershaw had a lights-out year in 2014, leading the league in ERA and wins. It's hard to believe that Kershaw will be anything less than spectacular in 2015, which should result in another Cy Young Award.

AL Cy Young: The AL Cy Young Award in 2015 will be a close call. Felix Hernandez, who the majority of fans expected to win the award in 2014, and Chris Sale, will most likely competing for the award. King Felix has been remarkable over the past 6 years, as he finished in the top 10 for the award and led the league in at least one category each year.

## TECHNOLOGY CORNER: DRIVERLESS CARS

Google has never failed to amaze this planet. Ever since Larry Page and Sergey Brin created this amazing company, the world has changed incredibly. Google is used by hundreds of millions of people every day, and has 3.5 billion searches per day. Google has invented its famous search engine, its own types of cell phones, and Google Glass. And now it has invented the driverless car. These cars are incredible pieces of technology, and are also extremely beneficial on several levels.

There are three things that make a driverless car what it is. The first is the GPS system, which is very similar to the type found in regular cars. This GPS calculates the route of the car, from start to finish. It looks at the maps and decides the best route, usually better than humans can. The second is a system that recognizes dynamic conditions on the roads. This system uses certain sensors, such as radar, cameras and lasers, in order to detect the space around it. The cameras let your car see its surroundings, the radar enables the car to sense up to a hundred meters around it, and the lasers scan the world around it in order to provide the car with a 3D image. The third and final thing is a device that processes the information from the GPS and the scanner into commands such as accelerate, brake, and steer. When all It is thanks to the work of three components are combined, a driverless Google car is formed.

Anyone who has ever driven a car, or even been a passenger in a car, knows how much of a hassle it is to drive. Knowing what all the meters mean, how much you should push the gas pedal, and how far to turn the steering wheel is just overwhelming. But with the driverless car, there is no steering wheel. There are no pedals. Just you sitting back and relaxing in the backseat while the car does all the work. Commutes will be less stressful and much quicker with the computer going at a steady pace while avoiding traffic. And once all cars are driverless, it will be more fuel effective, because cars can bunch together and maintain steady speeds. The Rocky Mountain Institute estimates that the reduction in wind drag alone from vehicles traveling closely together could reduce fuel use by 20-30 percent. Also, without humans having to drive and search for parking, the car can figure it out and park right away.

perhaps And the most important reason of all to have these cars is for safety. Already more than 33,000 people die each year in the US from crashes, and 40 percent of them are from human error. Without humans driving, roads will be safer and more reliable places.

Also, are you forgetting Angel Hernandez's gruesome non-home run call in which he failed to call a homer not once, but twice?

recent Even with the installment of the instant replay system umpires, League officiating at the highest level of baseball has been dreadful. Managers and players are being tossed from games left and right. Some of the worst calls in the history of baseball are being called. Umpire - manager feuds have become such an integrated part of baseball now that fans readily expect ejections when they go to the ballpark.

Of course, there is always the aspect of human error. It's possibly the only thing that prevents Major League Baseball from fully overthrowing their umpiring crews and revitalizing them. But even with that quite plausible defense of umpires, what goes on in the big leagues is insanely lackluster for professionals. Nobody exemplifies this message more than 23-year veteran umpire Angel Hernandez, who has redefined umpiring blunders forever.

The 52-year-old has been the laughingstock of the league for years

now. It is due to baseball's inability to punish its umpires that Hernandez is currently in the Major Leagues. In March of 2013, Grant Brisbee, a talented writer on SB Nation, wrote an article titled "Searching for a defense of Angel Hernandez." # HOCK OF THE HALLWAYS: ACING YOUR FINALS BY DOVI SCHLOSSBERG

Now, as we enter the last stretch of the school year, we release a sigh of relief. But wait – then we realize that there are still finals, Regents, and AP exams. Wait – before you panic, think about it like this: You've already learned and have been tested on all the material and have made it this far, so this is just a review.

In order to ace your finals, you need to study – a lot. Cramming the night before an exam really isn't an effective way of studying. Studies show that there is much greater retainment of memory over intervaled periods of time. The reason is because your brain recognizes the information and works harder to retrieve it from recent memory. This strengthens the memory of the information. Therefore, start studying as early as possible.

For subjects like Gemara, Halacha, Chumash/Navi, English, and History/Social Studies, review previous tests. Just look them over. Often, teachers and Rebbeim of these subjects will put previous test questions onto finals. For Regents math, science, and history subjects, the key to success is practice with real regents questions from resources like Barron's, Problem Attic, JMAP, NYSED and Regents Prep. These websites/books contain

authentic previous test questions, and in my opinion, are the best regents preparation sites/books.

For short definitions and concepts, flash cards are definitely the most effective study method. I know from personal experience, as well as my peers' experience, that flash cards are the best for memorizing vocabulary words and concepts.

After extensive research as to why this is true, it comes down to four major components. Firstly, the action of writing out the words greatly helps the brain retain the information action associates the information. This type of learning is called kinesthetic learning. Kinesthetic learning is learning through actions (i.e. writing). The second reason flash cards are so effective is because, in addition to the kinesthetic learning, there is also visual learning - that is - seeing the information. When using flash cards, aside from writing out the information, you also see the information every time you read it. This is also very helpful in retaining the information. In addition, flash cards utilize auditory learning as well, because when you read the information to yourself, your brain associates the information with the word on the front of the card. Lastly, flash cards are simple to use, don't contain too much information individually, and are small enough that they can be taken anywhere. It is for these reasons that for studying with flash cards is so effective.

Thirty-one people died just from the actual meltdown and that's not including all the victims who died later on from radiation-related diseases such as cancer. To top that all off, there was a devastating impact on the environment. Although people who are pro-nuclear power would like to say that this event occurred a long time ago and improvements have been made, meltdowns such as the recent one at Fukushima continue to occur. If there is a power outage at a nuclear plant, in a matter of days, it will melt down and have horrible consequences. Nuclear plants are a major target of extremists and terrorists. If a terror group manages to seize control of a nuclear power plant, there is no telling the horrors that can happen.

Another danger of nuclear power is the actual toxic waste that it produces. This harmful waste includes radioactive isotopes that have long half-lives, meaning that they will contaminate the world in one way or another for generations.

Uranium is also a very scarce resource, and only exists in a few select countries. This makes it very expensive to buy, and along with the actual tremendous cost of building a nuclear power plant, it costs far more than the energy and major risks that it produces. In the 21st century, it is only logical for us as a nation to promote nuclear power. The benefits of nuclear power are staggering, and the risks are minimal. Before anything, there's a simple fact of life that needs to be realized: The United States consumes a huge amount of energy. Despite Americans comprising a mere 5 percent of the world's population, we consume 24 percent of the world's energy. That energy needs to come from somewhere.

Nonrenewable energy sources, such as gas, coal and oil are awful for the environment, and we simply cannot rely on renewable energy sources, such as hydroelectric dams, wind turbines, and solar panels. Burning gas and coal releases huge amounts of greenhouse gases. And for renewable energy resources, they are simply not viable. Hydroelectric dams are limited to very few locations and have a large effect on the ecosystem that they're built in. Wind turbines are also limited to very few locations and produce much less energy than other energy sources. 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# ISRAEL REPORT: APOS THERAPY BY CHAIM ALPER

It's frustrating though to realize that his inability to call a good game started way back when he was in the minor leagues. NBC Sports' Hardball Talk Blog recently uncovered this from a Buffalo Newspaper:

"We're talking two decades ago, but Mike Harrington of the Buffalo News uncovered this article from way back in 1991, which notes that 'Hernandez is reputed around the league to be an umpire who yearns for the spotlight."

The investigation wasn't over just yet.

Here's more, from NBC Sports:

"He attracted notice in Saturday's series opener by calling a phantom balk on 13-year big-league veteran Rick Sutcliffe. Hernandez attracted more attention Sunday with a call at home plate that replays proved blatantly incorrect."

MLB fans aren't the only ones displeased with Hernandez's umpiring performance. "Just bad," Texas Rangers manager Ron Washington labeled the ump. "That's all there is to it."

Future Hall of Fame third baseman Chipper Jones said last season on Twitter, "[that] I will not watch a game, any game, officiated by Angel Hernandez! His incompetence amazes me and I'm tired of MLB doing squat about it! Nite." Even though he claimed that his night on twitter was over, the legend returned for more. "Our only recourse, as fans, is to turn the station whenever he, or his crew, are on the field. When viewer numbers go down, MLB will notice," he noted.

The game produced such bad calls that it triggered Zach Pratt to say this:

"How bad of a job is Angel Hernandez doing? He was trending in Minneapolis. For a Braves-Phillies game. That bad."

The displeasure for the veteran doesn't end there. Former Bears Defensive End Steve McMichael was infamously ejected from a Cubs game for calling out Hernandez before he sang "Take me out to the Ballgame." Better Know and Umpire, a section on Deadspin, released a statement saying that they too see why Hernandez is constantly voted by the players as one of the worst umpires in baseball. A broadcast of a game on YouTube even has the announcers saying that he went to the C.B. Buckner School of Umpiring - Buckner being the other most hated umpire in the game.

So this is where Rob Manfred's office is supposed to come in. This is also where the highly asked question of "Where are the penalties?" comes into play as well.

Just last season, when the Twins were (Continued on page 6)

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playing the Yankees, umpires failed to get a home run called overturned, even though they looked at instant replay. This expresses the incompetence of these umpires who did not know the rule in calling Justin Mourneau's two run home run a home run. The penalties issued by Bud Selig's office: absolutely nothing. ## SMOKE DETECTORS: THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH

There are countless lives that could be lost if we are not prepared for household fires. According to New York State law, single- and multiple-station smoke alarms to be located as follows:

- 1. On the ceiling or wall outside of each sleeping area separate the immediate vicinity of bedrooms.
- 2. In each room used for sleeping purposes.
- 3. In each story within a dwelling unit, including basements and cellars, but not including crawl spaces uninhabitable attics.
- 4. In dwellings or dwelling units with split levels without an intervening door between the adjacent levels, a smoke alarm installed on the upper level shall suffice for the adjacent lower level provided that the lower level is less than one full story below the upper level.

We should not take this haphazardly. There can be serious repercussions and ramifications if we do. I write this article hours after witnessing a tragic and catastrophic event. Living in the Midwood/Flatbush area of Brooklyn, there is a strong orthodox unity that is ostensible throughout the streets. That is why when we heard of the fire, the ripple of conjunctive sorrow spread throughout the community like wildfire. An NBC News article stated, "A Brooklyn house fire likely sparked by a hot plate, killing seven siblings trapped inside the home," is an "unbelievable tragedy," New York City Mayor Bill de Blasio said.

The childrens' mother and a single daughter managed to escape the flames, which gutted the home hours earlier and sent smoke billowing through the Midwood neighborhood as witnesses heard their desperate cries for help.

"It is unimaginable what you see in there," de Blasio said. "You can literally see what was once a home for a large and strong family, is now wiped out. A family fully vibrant just a mere 24 hours ago, is now no more. Every room empty, burned and charred."

All seven children, ages 5 to 16, died at a local hospital. Their mother and a 14-year-old daughter fled through second-floor windows and were in critical condition, suffering from burns and smoke inhalation, the surviving daughter passed away hours later; their father was in Israel at a conference, officials said.

The most unfortunate part of this occurrence is that it could have been easily avoided. Apparently, the house had only one smoke detector, in the basement. Had there been more, could this have been avoided? Maybe. But consequently, we must use this to learn to safeguard ourselves and our families. If we do not defend ourselves from unforeseen flames, we may all go "up in smoke," so to speak. A less perturbing, yet equally fundamental incident happened earlier that day. A house, less than 100 ft. away from mine, also succumbed to a fire. The entire first floor was burnt to a crisp from a fire that emanated from the kitchen. The common denominator in both cases is that there were no smoke the fact that these rules were enacted for a reason – to save lives. If we don't take them seriously enough to follow them, we are putting ourselves in harm's way. In short, smoke detectors should be utilized – not just for our own safety, but for the safety of our loved ones.

It is simply ridiculous to not promote nuclear power in the United States because of a possible risk that can be ultimately removed by having competent technicians and operators.

Another nuclear meltdown that has happened more recently is the 2011 Fukushima disaster. But this meltdown could also have been avoided. Many investigations have found that the power plants could have been built to withstand tsunamis. Additionally, it took a tsunami caused by a 9-magnitude earthquake to take out this plant. On average, a natural disaster of this capacity occurs once a year, and the chances of it affecting a nuclear plant again are even lower.

The risk of a nuclear meltdown actually happening is so minimal that it is simply ridiculous to refrain from using nuclear powering because of it. With competent oversight, this risk is only minimized. There's a reason there has never been a nuclear catastrophe in the United States. Nuclear power is the future of energy production in the United States, and it should only be promoted.

# LETTER TO THE EDITOR: ISRAELI ELECTIONS

DRS ISRAEL ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

After three terms as Prime Minister, on Tuesday, March 17, 2015 Benjamin (Bibi) Netanyahu captured a fourth term in office. The polls and political experts thought Issac Herzog's Zionist Union party would defeat Bibi and become the new force in Israeli politics. But with only a few hours left election, Bibi made announcement calling for all Israelis to cast their vote in the historic election, claiming that otherwise, the Israeli Palestinians (who are citizens of Israel and have the right to vote) would secure more seats in the Knesset than usual. The Israeli voters not only

listened to Bibi and headed out to the polls, but those who went out to the polls after his announcement were so impressed with Netanyahu that a majority of them voted for him and handed him a clear victory in the election.

Netanyahu, who has headed the Likud party for over two terms, is passionate about the defense and security of Israel against Iran. Iran is a rogue nation that has caused problems for the United States and threatened to destroy Israel for decades. For the past four years, Netanyahu has world warning the about how dangerous it would be not only for Israel, but also for the whole Europe and the United States if Iran were to go nuclear. Because of Netanyahu's passion for this topic, House Speaker John Boehner invited Bibi to address Congress about the dangers of a nuclear Iran. But the problem with this was that President Obama, who already had a strained relationship with Bibi, wasn't informed about the invitation Speaker Boehner extended Netanyahu (In fact, President Obama was still so offended by Netanyahu's decision to address Congress several weeks ago that he waited two days to congratulate him on the election victory). Herzog used this issue to campaign against Bibi, stating that he would do his best to work with the United States and Europe to prevent a nuclear Iran. He claimed that it was stupid of Netanyahu to President Obama and address Congress because now, Israel might have lost its most critical friend.

Since his surprise victory, one of Netanyahu's biggest challenges is to create his government. Netanyahu fired most of the ministers from his previous government, and now President Reuven Rivlin has (Continued on page 9)

given him just three weeks to form a new government. Under Israel's parliamentary system of government, a party needs to have control of a majority of the Knesset in order for the leader of that party to be the Prime Minister.

The Knesset, Israel's law-making body, has 120 seats, which is divided amongst Israel's ten most parties. powerful Right now, Netanyahu's party controls 30 seats, but they need to get 31 more seats in order to reach the minimum of 61 seats they need to govern. Joining with other political parties in order to together reach the magic number of 61 seats is called forming a coalition. Netanyahu's Likud party needs to find political allies from among the other parties that also won seats in the Knesset. Experts say this will be very difficult for Prime Minister Netanyahu. Netanyahu is currently Israel's second longest serving Prime Minister. David Ben-Gurion, Israel's founding leader, is the longest serving Prime Minister of Israel to date.
